HEAR EXERCISE

The acronym HEAR stands for:

- Highlight
- Explain
- Apply
- Respond

1. HIGHLIGHT

In the course of your investigation, one or two things - they can be specific words from an article or web page, an image from a book, passages from an interview, lyrics from a song, a video, a podcast, etc.) will usually stand out and connect with you. Highlight the parts that connect with you. Record the following.

- The name of the article / image / book / interview / song / video
- The specific parts the specific words from an article, an image from a book, passages from an interview, lyrics from a song - that especially connect with you. Copy them into this section.

2. EXPLAIN

you started.

- What event(s) is the passage from the article, book, interview, or song referring to? What were some things that were happening leading up to the event? What were some things that happened after?
- happened?

3. APPLY

After writing a short summary of what you think the passage means, you're ready to move on to the letter A which examines what it means to apply the text. This application is the heart of the process. Everything you've done so far culminates under this heading. As you've done before, answer a series of questions to uncover the significance of these verses to you personally, questions like:

- What does this resource teach me about reconciliation?
- What would the application of what I learned look like in my life?
- Does the resource identify an action or attitude to avoid or embrace? What would those be?

Challenge yourself to write between two and five sentences about how the text applies to your life.

4. RESPOND

Your response to the passage may take on many forms. You may write a call to action. You may describe how you'll be different because of what you learned. You may indicate what you're going to do because of what you've learned. Keep in mind that this is your response to what you've just read. Here are a few questions to help you get started.

- What's something I plan to do on September 30 (National Day for Truth and Reconciliation) to support the work for Truth and Reconciliation?

- If the resource identifies actions or attitudes to avoid or embrace, how can I do so consistently? Who is someone I can share what I learned with? Share it with them. What was their response?

Notice that all of the words in the HEAR formula are action words: highlight, explain, apply, and respond.

Learning isn't about sitting back and waiting for the answers into our laps. Instead of sitting back and waiting, do something that actively furthers your own learning.

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After you've highlighted a resource, you'll explain the meaning behind it. Here are a few questions to get
